









Effects, Mitigation and Significance







Challenges and Successes



- Fully understand community capacity (mapping)
- Working for community vs. proponent
- Significance criteria / measures . . . legacy tool
- EA during community elections . . . difficult dynamics
- Measuring significance . . . challenging concept
- Having an in-community advocate
- Culturally relevant diagrams . . . to explain concepts?
- Funding allocated meant hybrid review and impact assessment
