






TK for whales, caribou, medicine and more....

• "The hardest thing is to sit in a room with scientists who think they've discovered something, but their scientific discovery just confirms what our oral histories have talked about forever," says William Housty, a member of British Columbia's Heiltsuk First Nation and director of Coastwatch. "That's been the biggest hump for us to overcome, to get people to think about our culture on the same level as Western science."

A contemporary view.....

Dr. Stewart Gendron, Past President of Voisey's Bay Nickel - "in today's mining industry having access to traditional knowledge is so important because it allows companies to put in place more successful mitigation strategies to address the environmental and socioeconomic aspects of mining operations".



Examples of financial benefits:

- Hammersly Iron Pty Limited (Rio Tinto)
- Aboriginal communities affected
- Consultations saved company \$100 million and commenced production 6 months early
- Malampaya Deep Water to Gas Project (Shell)
- FPIC cost \$6m, \$36M construction costs saved due to construction finishing 3 months early



Academic Demonstration of TEK: Environmental Monitoring

☐ 5 PHD's from 3 universities collaborated with Elders to develop parameters for a model of environmental monitoring based on TEK and Science



Very high conductivity readings likely indicate high levels of arsenic and other mine leachates

☐ Youth from 3 First Nations in the Timmins area worked with Elders and Goldcorp scientists to be exposed to elements of both TEK and environmental sciences at the Coniaurum Reclamation Site
