

### Positionality as a process (context + experience)






# Business-as-usual consultations during COVID-19 are inadequate and do not meet Canada's Duty to Consult with Indigenous groups.




### New Regionalism

- Theory of regional development
  - emerging in the early 1990s to now
  - fosters regional cooperation, integration, and identity while shifting decision-making agency to local-level organizations
    - vs. "old" regionalism top-down governmental imposition
- In practice for Ontario's Far North?
  - Has potential, in-principle, but exists in western theoretical discourse



Indigenous regional development

- Theory of regional development
  - Recently proposed by community and scholars in Australia
  - Similar to new regionalism in shifting power to local organizations
  - Goes one step further to re-define perceptions of Indigenous communities from "passive" to "active" participants in regionals development

#### Bulletin - Exclusions of Time for Claim Holders Due to COVID-19

The ministry acknowledges that the COVID-19 outbreak and related public health requirements are special circumstances that have created challenges for all claim holders in Ontario. As a result, we are leveraging the tools available under the Mining Act to provide claim holders with relief through simplified exclusion orders.

Claim holders with claim anniversary dates on or before December 31, 2020, will be given an exclusion order by making a brief request via email. There will be no cost for COVID-19 related exclusion requests. The exclusion orders will remove the requirement to carry out assessment work for a period of time of up to 12 months.

2020, may also be included in your request if both of the following criteria are met:

- Claims are contiguous to eligible claims due within 30 days of the request; and
- Assessment work credit for work that will be performed in the future is intended to be distributed to all claims listed in the request.

The eligible claims you list in your request will be automatically protected from forfeiture until the ministry has processed your request. After the ministry processes your request, you will receive a copy of your exclusion order which will set a new anniversary (due) date for your claim(s) and the transaction will be entered onto the mining claim abstract(s).

#### Ontario to launch Junior Exploration Program




#### Ontario Launching New Junior Exploration Program

Ontario is launching a new cost-sharing program to help junior mining companies finance early mineral exploration. Through the Ontario Junior Exploration Program (OJEP), junior mining companies can apply for up to \$200,000 in funding per project to cover 50 per cent of eligible costs.

The Ontario government is investing \$5 million over two years in the new program, which will boost mineral exploration and support the province's economic recovery, growth and job creation, particularly in northern and Indigenous communities.

Once open, applications will be accepted online through the <u>Transfer Payment Ontario</u> (<u>TPON</u>) website during a five-week intake period, beginning on July 26, 2021. The application process will be done in two phases, with a second call for applications in early 2022.

### Legal Framework

**Canada** has a duty to prevent exposure to toxic and otherwise hazardous substances. All of the various human rights recognized by Canada are underpinned by the fundamental principle of non-discrimination.

All business enterprises in Canada have responsibilities to respect human rights. In fulfilling these responsibilities, business enterprises should identify and assess impacts of toxic exposure, and ensure prompt and accurate public reporting.

**Shared jurisdiction** between the federal and provincial government is not an excuse for shortcomings by the Government in taking prompt action to address toxic exposures

"And yet, rights to health, safe water and food, adequate housing, safe and healthy working conditions, and others implicated by toxics, do not appear to be directly actionable under Canadian law."

"While constitutional recognition of protection against discrimination is applauded, it does not appear to have served as a significant safeguard or recourse for disproportionately affected communities."




# Protecting Inherent Rights

Living up to the promise of reconciliation means action is required now to prevent further violations of Indigenous rights. To fulfill this duty, we call on Canada and Ontario to enact a moratorium to sustain the lands and waters that, since time immemorial, have been relied upon by region's First Nations.



## Protecting Boreal Watersheds

The ancient peatlands of this region continue to serve as significant carbon sinks and have been cooling the whole earth for millennia. An immediate moratorium safeguards one of the few remaining intact boreal peatlands and protects both us and the generations that follow.



## Watersheds Under Threat

Thousands of approved and pending claims for exploration already exist in the Ring of Fire. Together these claims present a high likelihood of cumulative environmental, cultural, and social impacts to the boreal and James Bay lowlands region and its Indigenous peoples.
